CONFUSION NEVER LOOKED SO GOOD, OR SO FAMILIAR.

Errors | noun (plural)

... the unintended consequences of being human: missteps, misjudgements, misrecognitions — moments where intention collides with reality and falls disastrously short.

Errors are how we get lost, how we hurt each other, how we become strangers to ourselves — but also, sometimes, how we stumble into truth.

So, welcome to Ephesus – the great hustling, bustling (with the emphasis on hustling!) metropolis of Europe – the perfect place to lose yourself. Utterly.

This city pulses with bureaucratic-derangement, broken immigration systems and capitalist fever, political dogfights, fierce border patrols and spiraling debt, enchanting nightlife, cheap thrills and grifter's magic. Into that milieu, tumbles a family torn apart by war, exile, and rotten bloody luck, but they are given the chance to create their own miracle – to find each other again after decades apart! But how do you find anything when everyone is lost, everyone is on the make, everyone is searching for something: asylum, belonging, connection, or simply themselves?

Sport for Jove's modern, razor-sharp take on *The Comedy of Errors* shatters Shakespeare's mistaken identity farce wide open — exposing the ache of dislocation, the absurdity of city living, and the miracle

of rediscovery and reconciliation. As lives are upended and egos unravel, what emerges is something far greater than farce: the healing power of reunion, and the liberation of laughter that reminds us we're still human after all. Even if we don't exactly know who the hell we are...

Fast, funny, and ferociously relevant, this is Shakespeare with the volume up and the heart wide open, where errors are both chaos and catalyst: a comedy of wrong turns that somehow leads us home. So, go on, get lost... to get found.

The world premiere of a special new work, made by Sport for Jove, commissioned by the NSW Department of Education. In his electrifying new play *Prometheus*, Damien Ryan reimagines the pulse-pounding showdown between the ancient Greek Gods and the Titan, Prometheus, through the lens of our rapid development of Artificial Intelligence and the inherited duties of creation and consequence we face as we race inexorably toward machines that can think for themselves.

What are we thinking in doing so? Will we flourish? Or are we manifesting our own destruction?

Like the mythic Prometheus who stole fire from the gods, Al emerges here as humanity's stolen spark — powerful, unpredictable, and teetering on the edge of salvation or catastrophe. A Sydney-based Al start up releases the world's first sentient, generative intelligence program onto the internet, charged with enhancing human flourishing. From there, the world changes forever.

Theatrical and innovatively written to allow a cast of 6 actors or entire class of 30 to work on the play, and inviting personal contributions and adaptations of the work from its cast, the narrative crackles with mythic echoes and ancient hubris reborn in silicon and code, moral dilemmas as AI reaches beyond its makers, and unforeseen tensions as technology revolutionises the experience of being human.

Prometheus may no longer be a chained Titan on a craggy peak — but in this new play's bold staging, the fire he gave us might just light the fuse to our own reckoning.

THE CRUCIBLE SYMPOSIUM

"...a person is either with this court or he must be counted against it, there be no road between..."

Wild forces are loose in Salem, 1692. Are witches casting spells? Is it the Devil roaming the town? Or are more human forces at work?

A group of young girls are caught dancing naked in the woods and a crisis is triggered as these oppressed and brutalised young women try to save themselves and realise they have discovered a path to power.

Secrets and hypocrisies run riot as deep feelings, supressed and denied, erupt and a society divides and begins to question the very foundations of morality and their existence.

This play, both epic in its poetry and domestic in its focus, explores the past, the present and our future with a rare power and complexity.

One of Shakespeare's truly original and most personal plays, *The Tempest* is a symphonic vision of forgiveness, discovery and self-discovery. Famous for its language, context, enchanting characters and breathtaking theatricality, the play is a reflection of the world's most famous playwright at the height of his powers and at the end of his remarkable career.

This tempest is not only in Prospero – the storm lies in the contradictions and ambiguities the story throws up about freedom and slavery, civilisation and barbarism, legacy and letting go, lust and chastity, youth and age, revenge and forgiveness. The sea is a place of transformation but also represents the capriciousness of nature, chaos, or fate.

Sport for Jove will unpick the play with students through live performance and analysis, and direct contrast and comparison with Margaret Atwood's *Hag-Seed* in this unmissable performance symposium.

THE MERCHANT OF VENICE SYMPOSIUM

BY WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE

The Merchant of Venice is an eternally relevant study of justice, mercy, and religious division. It's a story Shakespeare couldn't resist: an unfathomable sadness in a man's heart; the mysterious terrors of the ocean; hate crime and religious intolerance; money, and our willingness to gamble with our lives – things that still hurt and hinder us to this day in our struggle to know the difference between mercy and justice.

The Merchant of Venice features some of Shakespeare's most extraordinary characters, such as Portia, the brilliant young woman who dresses as a man to save a merchant's life, or Bassanio, the man with nothing who would have it all at any cost, or Jessica, the girl who would trade her mother's and father's memories for a monkey.

And at the centre of them all, in the court of Venice, stands a Jewish moneylender, Shylock, legally demanding a pound of flesh from a man who is willing to have his heart torn out of his body as a gesture of love for his friend.


